8. Quinton Farmers Diary Summer 2023

Time flies by in the farming calendar as it doesn't seem five minutes since I was writing the Spring edition.

We went from a very dry February to a cold, wet March with the weather finally allowing us to establish our Spring Oat crops on the farm over the Easter weekend so when you were all feasting on Easter Eggs, we were hard at work in the fields.

The wheat crops in Lower Farm, Village and Watt fields were slow developing through the month of March but the warmer weather in April pushed the crops through their various growth stages at a rapid rate meaning the flag leaf (the final leaf to emerge before the ear of wheat) came out around the 18th May which is traditionally as expected and is mainly governed by the length of daylight hours.

The grass weed which has emerged in Lower Farm field above the wheat is called black grass which is the most difficult and costly weed to control in our arable crops. It is a marine plant and thrives in wet heavy soils with poor drainage, which is why there is more of the weed in the eastern side nearest Preston Deanery on the heavier wetter soils and to the north of the Quinton sewerage works. This area to the north was traditionally known as "Clayty" when the big field was made up of many smaller fields in times gone by. This area is made up of a very heavy clay soil which is poorly drained.

The crop of Crusoe winter wheat in Lower Farm field is being grown for seed production and will be harvested, stored separately to the other wheat on the farm which will go to central storage for milling. The seed crop will be collected at harvest, taken to a seed processing plant, cleaned, bagged, and sold to farmers nationwide providing it meets the required germination standard which is 90% and weed free. The seeds are sieved and sorted in the lab and then a known quantity is grown on a bed of sand and counted to get the percentage germinated. You do not want to be buying seed if half of what you buy will not grow!

Our spray operator Laurence has been busy applying herbicides to control the broadleaf weeds and the crops have received 4 fungicide sprays roughly 3 weeks apart to the crops to keep disease free. The 2 main wheat diseases we are aiming to control are Septoria and Yellow Rust. We only apply these products when and where necessary and all applications are targeted at specific weeds and diseases.

Dan our fertiliser spreader operator has been busy applying nitrogen with our variable rate technology across the crops. We have been through the wheat crops 4 times applying the nitrogen on a little and often approach. You may have noticed some flags in Village Field, these are marking out a trial area for a different fertiliser product which we are trialling for A.D.A.S (an independent provider or agricultural research and development) part of the fertiliser is made up of a product mined in North Yorkshire making it unique as nearly all the fertiliser we use in the UK must be imported from abroad.

The wild bird seed mixes were established in May and are now emerging although they desperately need rain.

As I write this, all the ears of wheat have fully emerged and over the coming weeks the grain will fill and the crops will start to senescence which is the process of plant aging and ripening. Ideally, we need some more rain and bright sunny days but a top temperature of no more than 22 degrees. Too hot and the wheat plants shut down and do not fill the grains in the ears leading to lower yields and poorer quality.

Harvesting of the wheat crops usually takes place in early August, the team will be under pressure to get the harvest in at the optimum time. Please be aware that there will be increased tractor and trailer movements around the rural roads during this very busy period.
