7. Quinton Farmers Diary – Winter 2023

Oh what an autumn! Have you noticed that it has been raining? I think we should consider growing rice. I have never known the ground so wet. Since 1st August we have had 357mm of rainfall at Quinton Green. This compares to 250mm the previous autumn of which 100mm fell in November 2022. Last winter I invested in three remote weather stations which are located at Quinton Green and at our farms at Silverstone and Buckingham. They record rainfall by the hour as well as high and low temperatures, humidity and wind speed and direction. This information is easily accessible via an App on all farm staff mobile phones. This has proved very valuable and saved a great deal of travelling between farms only to find when you get there it is raining and you cannot undertake the field work planned.

The oilseed rape fields along the Preston Deanery Road have been growing and thickening out. The companion crop of buckwheat flowered and then the first frost in early November killed it off as it is very frost susceptible. During its short lifespan the buckwheat scavenged phosphate from the soil and when the plants die back the phosphate was released into the soil and taken up by the oilseed rape plants to aid its growth. The berseem clover companion crop carried on growing through the early frosts but was killed by the harder more prolonged frosts in early December. Berseem clover is a nitrogen fixing crop which as it dies back releases the nitrogen for the benefit and further growth of the oilseed rape crop.

The fields have recently been sprayed with a herbicide which contained two active ingredients, one is a residual which works through the soil to control the roots of the blackgrass and the second is a contact active ingredient which controls the mayweed and sow thistles through contact with the plants leaves.

We started our autumn winter wheat drilling campaign on the 9th October and this proved to be a very big challenge due to the very high levels of rainfall. We did manage to get all of the winter wheat crops drilled by the 28th October although out of all the crops drilled 70% look OK, 20% are poor and 10% have failed due to waterlogged ground conditions which has resulted in rotten seed coupled with the constant slug pressure. Usually when we have completed the winter wheat drilling, we move on to drilling the winter beans. Unfortunately, the soil has been so wet we have not been able to drill any of the beans and we wait for a dry 2-week period to allow the soils to dry out so that we can get onto the fields.

A polite reminder for all the walkers. We have various well marked rights of way/public footpaths across our land and we ask that you please keep to them and if you are walking your dog, please keep it under control and on the footpath and don't allow it to roam across the open fields. As you know we have many grass margins around the fields and these are wildlife corridors and are not to be walked on by members of the public as this negates the benefits the margins give to our wildlife.
