

Conditions for the granting of a license to the first Ale House in QUINTON, 1612

The condicon of this Recognizance is such That whereas the within bounden JOHN SILSBY is admitted and allowed by SIR WILLIAM TATE SIR WILLIAM SAMWELL and SIR WILLIAM SAUNDERS knights to keepe a comon alehouse and to use comon selling of ale or beere only within the nowe house of him the said JOHN scituate in QUINTON aforesaid if therefore he the said JOHN during the tyme as he shall keepe such comon Alehouse there shall not suffer any unlawfull play at Tables dyce Cards or any other unlawfull games to be used in his house or other his ground or place nor cause or suffer any flesh to be dressed to be eaten upon any day forbidden by the lawes and statutes of this Realme of England nor witting admitt or receive into his howse any person notoriously defamed of or for Theft incontynency or drunckenes or That shalle beforehand notified to him by the Constable or Thirdborough of the said towne to be a unmet person to be received into a Comon alehouse nor lodge there any strang person above the space of one day and night together without notice first given to the Constable or other officer or his or their deputy nor utter or sell lesse than one full ale quart of the best beere or ale for a penny and of the small two quarts nor suffer any person inhabiting in the same towne to remain tipling and drinking in the said howse And finally if he the said JOHN SILESBY during all the tyme as he shall use comon selling of ale there shall keepe good order and rule That then this Recognizance to be payd or els to stand in force and vertue.
